Thinking of blooms in general, it is never too early to think of organising seeds or plants for gardens, hanging baskets and window boxes, in readiness for the Parish in Bloom competition. We were very successful in our first entry in 2013, due to the combined efforts of residents, councillors and our grounds staff; having set the standard last year we look forward to more success this year, with even more gardeners joining up and sharing their ideas with us. At this time every year the precept must be set for the following year, and we have deliberated carefully, before deciding not to increase the precept this time. This cannot be the outcome each year, as economic factors nationwide dictate that increases are necessary. We try to be as prudent as possible on behalf of all parishioners, whilst maintaining necessary standards of care of equipment, buildings and services. This has been a very difficult decision and will, of necessity, mean we must look closely at all expenses, including grants, and occasional concessions for some hirers of our facilities. We aim to strike a fair balance for all concerned, and will continue to look after the best interests of this parish. It must be remembered, however, that we as a Parish Council do not receive an official grant (unlike the District Council which does receive it). We have a very tight budget within which to meet all our commitments, and external auditors monitor and guide us on all financial matters.

## Remembrance Service

This service was, as always, very well attended on Sunday 10th November at the War Memorial in Park Street, with music by Ian la Riviere. Local organisations were well represented with Cadets, Scouts, Guides, Brownies, Rainbows mustering, and schoolchildren came with posies. Parents brought babies in prams, teenagers joined in, and many of our grandparents' generation were there too – joining councillors and staff to pay our respects to those who have died in the honourable service of our country. It is always moving to see the wide age-range of the assembled ranks, and to hear the promise, as always, "We will remember them". Park Street Residents' Association has asked us to take on the organisation of this event in future years, and we are happy to undertake this important duty.

## Greenwood Park

Following the confirmation of our second year of qualifying for the Green Flag award at Greenwood Park, the awards body made a 'mystery shopping' visit last Autumn and later informed us: "The Council, staff and the community should feel a real sense of pride and achievement for what is accomplished at this park. It provides real value for money, as a class of local park that isn't overloaded with too many features, but that contributes to the overall parks provision and visitor experience." We are very pleased to receive this confirmation, and we thank all the staff and parishioners who make Greenwood Park such a pleasant place to visit. It is our hope that we may be able to gain Green Flag recognition for Park Street Recreation Ground in the very near future.



## The Parish Carol Concert

The Christmas season got off to a fine start with our annual carol concert in the Community Centre, Greenwood Park. Residents filled the hall and, in the presence of our MP Anne Main and St. Albans Mayor Annie Brewster, they enjoyed a splendid evening of traditional carols and lessons supported by local churches and schools. Penny Farmer brought along her donkey as part of the nativity scene at the entrance to the hall. The Concert Choir was as usual in fine voice and this year the atmosphere was enhanced with the addition of a brass band provided by The Watford Band, which gave the evening a real Christmassy feel. Finally, the choir sang 'We Wish You A Merry Christmas', and everyone was invited by the Council to join them for tea and mince pies. Many thanks to the Air Cadets and everyone else who helped to make the evening a great success.

## Frogmore footpaths

An application has been made by the Parish Council to have the footpath which runs around the back of the Frogmore lakes, Park Street, made a 'Designated Footpath'. The application supported by, at the last count, 43 statements of evidence from local people using the path over the last 20 years, was sent to the County Council last autumn. A letter from them says that it has been allocated a score of 32, and is first on their list and should be dealt with within the next few months. We thank Jon Breen for his work as the driving force behind the application and the statements of evidence. If successful, we should see an end to the obstructions troubling the users of the path for the past two and a half years.

## Wildflower meadow

St Julian's meadow to the north of St Julian's Wood is a site of immense value for flora and fauna and public amenity. It provides a home for many colourful wildflowers, and is a natural home for butterflies, bees and grasshoppers. Small mammals find food and become food for prey species like kestrels, sparrow hawks, owls, kites, foxes and badgers. All will find food in this diverse landscape. In recent years over 95% of wildflower meadows have disappeared; these can never be replaced exactly, but they can be recreated, with long term commitment. We own this site and have managed it with grant aid from Natural England for 20 years. Hay has been cut and carted from site each year, progressively reducing fertility to suit local or indigenous species of plant.



## A405 bus shelters - progress at last!

The problems with the bus shelters on either side of the A405 at Bricket Wood have now been discussed on-site with representatives of the Passenger Transport Unit and the Highways Agency. The meeting was held on an extremely wet day which emphasised some of the problems bus users had to endure with a large puddle at the bus stop. We also discussed the general condition of the shelters, the suitability of their location, sight lines for waiting passengers and access footpaths. We felt that the meeting was very positive and we await the ideas of the various agencies to resolve the problems. Hopefully we won't have to wait too long.

## News from Brown Owl


1st Park Street Rainbows and Brownies relocated in September 2013 to the Parish Centre and have been made very welcome. As part of our hiring agreement we have storage facilities at minimal cost, for all our activity and craft equipment which is essential to run our organisation successfully. The premises are clean and bright with adequate parking facilities, for parents to drop off and pick up their children safely. In addition to the Tennyson Hall we have the use of the large field which in good weather we use for nature projects. We hope that this Summer we can again use the field as we will be celebrating 100 years of Brownies.

## Planning

Two planning applications have caused concerns in recent times: (1) to build 100 houses on the Building Research Establishment (BRE) grounds, Bricket Wood and (2) to build 14 luxury houses on Green Belt land in Cherry Hill, Chiswell Green. Both were refused by St. Albans District Council (SADC) and both have gone to appeal. The BRE site appeal is to be a public hearing at SADC offices, over 9 days. Interested parties will have an opportunity to speak at the hearing. The date is likely to be in April 2014. The appeal for the Cherry Hill site will have taken place in February. The Parish Council represents your interests at these hearings.

Recently unscrupulous developers in the Parish have cut down mature trees which have had Tree Preservation Orders (TPO's) placed upon them. This is being investigated by SADC. TPO's are imposed to preserve trees for all future generations to enjoy. Any attempt to remove them, or carry out work on them, must be with prior written consent of the District Council.

We urge you to report any instances of a tree that may be the subject of a TPO, in danger of being felled or damaged, or where this has already occurred. ## Rail Freight Interchange

Since 2005/6, Helioslough has wanted the development; St. Albans District Council, STRIFE, our Parish Council and the residents don't want it. We are told that decision making should be devolved down to local people, and we don't want it. At the County Council meeting on 9 December it was decided that a decision would be made as to whether they sell or lease the land after the 'go ahead' decision has been made. Therefore, we are waiting for the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government to make a decision.



### Interested in growing your own produce?

The Council has three allotment sites across the parish; one in Park Street Lane, Bricket Wood and two within Greenwood Park, Chiswell Green. Although the site in Bricket Wood is full, there are vacant plots on both sites within Greenwood Park. The annual cost is just £12 for a small plot and £20 for a large plot. As most people will know, our Parish Council regularly helps to fund local charitable organisations and residents' associations, whenever possible. It is gratifying to hear later how this helps residents. Some recent letters of thanks gave news of, for example, St Luke's Church Lunch Club where lunches are served to elderly, single people on Mondays. Also, our residents' associations are pleased to receive £100 annually for bulbs or wildflower seeds, to plant in the hedgerows, adding colour to the villages. We are pleased to support such activities, and hope to be able to afford this support in future, while still keeping the precept as low as possible.

### Woodland news

Both Blackgreen Wood and St. Julian's Wood have been given grants towards the ongoing management programme of these Parish Council owned woodlands. These grants will enable us to ensure that the woods continue to be a source of enjoyment for years to come and at the same time provide a sustainable habitat for wildlife. As part of this project we have been ably assisted by two volunteer groups, Friends of Hanstead Wood who extended their field of activity to help clear more of the invasive holly in Blackgreen Wood, and Friends of St. Julian's Wood who planted the 100 trees donated by the Woodland Trust, to help extend the area of St. Julian's Wood. 


### The 2014/2015 parish precept - 0% increase

The precept is the amount of council tax that funds our services in your parish and it is set by Parish Councillors at a public Council meeting. For 2014/15 we have agreed to freeze the precept.
